Are Pride Parades Social Action?

This question is certainly a valid one, and a good reminder of why we march. The parades are a major PR opportunity for us, but for a real reason and not just for a party. Those parades and street fairs are a chance for us to do ministry, reaching folks who have been abused because of their orientation or identity, often in the name of religion. The It Gets Better campaign and increasing number of school G/S Alliances point towards more acceptance, but negative messages still abound. For decades, lesbian and gay teens have felt isolated, absent from media portrayals, and condemned by institutions and politicians. Substance abuse among LGBTQ people is double that of the general population, and suicide rates are triple. The numbers are even worse in the transgender community. And homelessness: as many as 40% of youth on the streets are LGBTQ, many of whom were kicked out of their homes or fled for their physical safety. We march for others who have a shortage of pride, to give them a lifeline, a glimmer of hope. Many people know vaguely, if at all, of our welcoming congregations, of our affirming message and inclusive faith.

The Alan Ross Texas Freedom Parade takes place on Sunday, September 20th at 2pm. Parade participants must be in line by

noon. The recent court decisions give us much to celebrate, and a wedding theme. The Dallas extravaganza is a regional event, attracting at least 30-40,000 from all over North Texas. We're working on a new concept for our float – including a blimp and a trolley bus for Dallas (with AC!) – details will be coming soon.

Let's show our support this year and show up in numbers. We will have car pooling from Community UU Church to First Unitarian Church immediately after our Sunday service. We will need drivers for car pooling. From 1st Church, there will be shuttles to take you to the start of the parade and bring you back. If you are unable to walk the parade, there will be a trolley or bus in the parade to ride on. The parade will end at Reverchon Park instead of Lee Park this year. After the parade, there will be a fair in the park. Look for our NTUUC booths. There will be one booth set up in the Main Area and one booth in the Family Zone. Volunteers are needed to help at both booths.

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Patrick's Ponderings "Faith"

The word "faith" gets kicked around a lot, meaning many different things at different times, and being both a noun and a verb. We often are asked to describe or explain our faith, or what we have faith in, as well as what faith do we belong to. We also claim to have "faith" within various situations, meaning everything from confidence to trust and loyalty.

In my current course work at SMU to become certified as a "spiritual director," I am constantly reflecting on what "faith" is and how do we assist others in their faith journey. There are many different ways to approach faith formation. One model I find useful breaks the process of faith formation into three basic parts or steps:

- -Figuring out what we have faith in: Discovery
- -How do we embrace our faith as our own? : Deepening
- -How do we live out and share our faith?: Professing/Witnessing

In September I will be discussing and we will explore what these steps in faith might mean for us as individuals, and especially as a liberal religious community in our place and time. Like much of life all of this starts with being present. Literally showing up to worship and community activities are essential to being "faith-full" rehearsing and building the beloved communities we desire. See you in church. Blessings, Patrick

A Time for Rest and Renewal

The mind that comes to rest is tended in ways that it cannot intend: Is borne, preserved, and comprehended by what it cannot comprehend. Poet Wendell Berry — "Another Sunday Morning Comes"

Anticipation. Trepidation. Excitement. Those are just a few of the emotions running through me as I write this. Some of you may know I'm taking a sabbatical this fall. Others may be hearing this for the first time. I'm sure you have questions. I'll try to answer them!

The word "sabbatical" comes from "shabbat," the Hebrew word for "rest". The ancient Hebrews let their land rest every seven years to help ensure its productivity. Most Unitarian Universalist churches provide their professional staff with time to renew their productivity every five to seven years. A sabbatical is a time for intentional spiritual exploration and reflection, for renewing enthusiasm, for creativity, and deepening a commitment to service and ministry. It gives time for professional development in ways that aren't possible during the press of activity in a typical work year. To quote the Sabbatical Handbook put out by LREDA (the religious educators professional association): "Sabbaticals are not vacations, but pathways to viewing vocations in new ways, through fresh eyes. The goal is to return to the congregation renewed, refreshed."

What's in it for the congregation? Again, from LREDA: "Religious educators make an intense commitment of time and energy to their congregations. This work schedule allows for little opportunity for thoughtful enrichment, analysis, study and evaluation. The congregation grows through the sharing of creative abilities in meeting the programming needs during the sabbatical and also benefits from the renewed enthusiasm of the Director upon her return."

How long? I will be away from the day-to-day work of the church from October 1 to February 28. Who will do the work? The RE Board has assumed the administration of the program, dividing the workload by asking each board member to be the lead for a particular class level. The minister and worship team will take on the Message for All Ages. Volunteers have stepped up to work on Children's Chapel, bulletin boards, calendars, special events, parties, and preparing for the rummage sale. And, thanks to the farsighted planning of the church Board of Trustees, there are funds set aside to hire a quarter-time acting DRE to be here on Sunday mornings and help manage the program. You'll be in good hands!

What will I do? I'll be traveling some of the time, visiting churches with vibrant RE programs and exciting multigenerational programs. I'll spend some extended time strengthening connections with friends and family. I anticipate having time to read, write, draw and sing. I will work on completing the requirements to become a Credentialed DRE through the UUA's credentialing program. And I will take time to explore and develop new spiritual practices that will help sustain me as I return to immerse myself in this intense and wonderful ministry of religious education.

Will you hear from me? I won't be at church, going to committee meetings, or attending events. I will, however, continue to be virtually present, through bulletin board updates, blog posts, and newsletter articles. And I'll be back in March, refreshed, renewed, and ready to plunge back into the day-to-day life of the congregation.

July Financial Report

The July 2015 financial summary for our operating accounts is listed below. The only variances worth noting are (1) cumulative pledge income is down, caused by some late-starting automated pledge payments, which should be caught up next month, (2) Religious Education expenses are under budget due to a targeted donation by a church member, and (3) Facilities expenses are over budget due to a leak repair and installation of a shutoff valve at the front of the church.

We had a big shock last month in our water bill which isn't reflected in the financials. A bizarre situation caused a defunct sprinkler zone along Parker Road to run 3-1/2 hours every night when the sign lights were turned on. The problem has now been fixed, 200,000 gallons and \$1,500 later. We have submitted a credit request to the City of Plano and are awaiting their decision.

The new monthly *Share the Plate* offerings (last Sunday of each month) brought in \$171.87 for the New Orleans fund in June and \$356.00 for God's Pantry in July. If you forget your checkbook or can't make the worship service on any *Share the Plate* offering date, you can make
