Our Journey to Now - Thoughts on Stewardship

Approaching my second year as a member of Community Church, when I think about stewardship, what comes to mind is my path from seeking and finding to joining and supporting this church, and my hopes that both those currently among us, and those yet to find us, will follow.

I moved across the country to Texas, alone, without a partner or a pet or even so much as a houseplant for company, and while my new coworkers were friendly and game for going out after work, the conversation was always about work and generally gossip, neither of which were welcoming or provided any comfort. I was invited to a happy hour here, a direct-sales home party there... I'd look around the room with a forced smile, and wonder if this was my life now. I'd go home unhappy.

But my first visit to Community Church, I was greeted with smiles at every turn, asked about my interests, and introduced to others who shared them. My second visit, it was more of the same! Even a hug or two. As a new member, I was invited to a wonderful and welcoming brunch, and when I looked around the room, I was so thrilled to have found company that was so smart, funny, and kind, and so engaged with the world and with each other. I'd found my people. I enjoy my job as much as the average person, but my workplace is fast-paced, high-pressure, and very results-oriented. When I first moved here I struggled. There was no grace period for learning the ropes, no patience for questioning the status quo, and little tolerance for being human and having needs beyond promotions or benefits, such as mentorship, encouragement, or appreciation. Meanwhile, here at Community as I started to interact more with members, I was approached to join the leadership development workshop series called

It was supportive, inclusive, and inspirational, and it gave me a fresh perspective on challenges I already faced in the workplace, and might face as I engaged more and more with Community Church.

Like anyone, I've had personal challenges in the past few years: emergencies, illnesses, and deaths among friends and family. Like everyone, I watched in

With all of the chaos and confusion of our time, it is common for some to tell us "to just let it go," and for others to cry to "hold on, and never let go." When I see articles or columns on "Letting Go" they eventually bring up the Buddhist practice of non- attachment, which is a very important and valuable philosophy and practice. Central to this and most spiritual or religious practice is a heightened sense of awareness, of being "present" to the moment at hand. All of this sounds great and very "Zen" if you will. But the purpose of all of it is for us be able to be ware of what our choices are in every moment, and the freedom to make the best possible choices we can.

Granted, our choices often become habituated into unthinking routine, but that is why we need more awareness. So often we focus on the "go" part of "letting go" when the powerful part is the recognition that it is a matter of choice whether we hold on to material things, or a grudge, or an out dated fantasy of what our lives should be. (Continued from front page) horror as tragedies unfolded in the wider world, from natural disasters to police brutality to large-scale violence perpetrated by individuals against entire communities. I didn't know what to do with the hurt, the confusion, or the fear I was feeling, the pain of loss, the not knowing what to do or how to help in the face of others' losses.

Here at Community, I found a place to express that grief and to release it. To share with others the pains of life and by doing so, lessen their burden. To see that there was a higher place to get to, an inner peace to aspire to, a safer and more just world to be created... and all around me, people willing to work together for it.

In short, Community has been here for me before I knew I needed it, time and time again, in so many ways. It's my sincerest hope that others come to discover the friendship, support, and love that we as a congregation have to offer, and that those of us already here can fully absorb all that we have to give... but as a church we can't pour from an empty vessel. It takes many hands and many hearts to commit to making Community's dreams a reality, but to speak plainly, it also takes funding. We can't overlook the basics of safe and secure facilities that are comfortable to gather in, or the compensation and benefits of those who devote themselves to service. Visitors may not give a thought to these things, they're simply wondering where to sit, if they'll know the hymns, and what sort of snacks will be available later. It's up to us as members to come together and support this church by pledging. With our needs ever increasing and as we seek to expand our vision, so do we need an increase in pledges from all of us, as far as we are able to stretch towards our common goals. As our stewardship campaign gets underway, I call upon each of you to consider what Community Church has meant, directly and personally, and to pledge your support accordingly.

Note from the DRE: This month we are reprinting a timely article by Laurel Amibile, Annual Program Fund Director at the UUA. She says it better than I ever could! She writes:

Religious teachings have been highly influential in the development of philanthropic culture and giving practices around the world. Throughout American history, religious philanthropy has prompted social change by addressing the major issues and ills facing society of the times.

Congregations and faith communities fill an important role in today's society by providing the worship and learning environments to convey the virtues and values of generosity, giving, stewardship and volunteer service. These communities provide a set of religious values and theological teachings to which young learners can link and reflect upon their daily lives. This is part of our faith formation process as human beings, continuing throughout our lifetimes.

There are three key ways that children learn about generosity and stewardship:

- Modeled voluntary behavior by a parent or trusted care-giver with the intention to help others. This begins in infancy, through the infant's experience of caring and sharing which leads to the development of empathy.
- Cognitive learning opportunities that include thinking, reflection, and discussion on the part of the learner. These stimulate understanding of the cause and effect of giving behavior.
- Experiential "learning by doing" on the part of the learner—opportunities to engage in giving and serving activities from which they can draw emotional satisfaction and meaning.

How is this done? Through an intentional educational process that includes:

- Presenting the concepts and stories that promote understanding of giving, generosity, and stewardship in the life of a community.
- Identifying the reasons why people choose to give and practicing generosity, and the methods for stewardship and the careful tending of resources.
- Providing the experiences and opportunities for individual and communal reflection.

Nathan Dungan, former financial advisor, marketing VP, author and creator of the *Share, Save, Spend* system for personal finance suggests that the marketing message directed at our children is "see money, spend money," with the emphasis on the *micro impact* of satisfying their own needs. They rarely get the *macro impact* message that balances their spending with saving and sharing in intentional ways: "The choices we make with our money can change the world." Dungan has devoted a website to teaching people of all ages to take responsibility for their money and their sharing, saving and spending choices.

There are a variety of helpful materials to help parents and educators create learning experiences and activities that nurture generosity and stewardship in their children and teenage youth. Games and stories, combined with experiential activities to learn these values by doing, are particularly effective teaching tools. The Stewardship Game and links to online resources **on the following page** offer a starting place for engaging this learning process.

January Financial Report

Finance Report by Dick Hildenbrand, Treasurer

The January financial summary for our operating accounts is listed below. We're about \$11,750 short of where we should be at this point in the year (+\$3,846 vs +\$15,604). Much of this gap will close and we currently see about a \$4,000 gap by the end of the year. Stay tuned on how we're looking at closing that gap.

17-18 Budget: The initial budget has been worked up for June 2017 – May 2018. To meet this budget, we need \$260k in pledges, up from \$235k this year. We know it's a steep jump (\sim 10%), and we'll have several after-church workshops over the next couple of months so everyone can understand our financial situation and options.

17-18 Pledge: Pledge forms, both paper (in the foyer) and on-line (use Pledge Now button below), are available to make your pledge for the new church year (Jun 17 – May 18). Especially if you haven't increased your pledge over the past few years and you're not constrained by a fixed or limited income, please consider a generous increase.
