Congregational Meeting for Future of Building Project

Have you seen the changes in the church building? At the date of this writing, the roof leaks have been sealed, the ugly tarps have been taken down, and most of the damaged ceiling tiles have been replaced. By the time of publication, renovations of the nursery and back classroom should be well underway, and there are more changes coming. This brings us to the next item -- how to pay for it.

This coming January 17th after services will be a special congregational meeting to determine just that. Our building is undergoing some major and much-needed changes, and now is the time to determine how to pay for it.

To refresh everyone's memory, there are several pieces to our building repair. The inside work consists of a temporary fix for leak mitigation, and renovations to the nursery and back classroom. The outside work consists of the roof replacement itself, which will occur in parallel with some of the inside work. And the final piece is the financing, discussion and (hopefully) approval of that will occur on the 17th.

This is an important growth opportunity for our church, and affects almost every aspect of church life. Please make plans to attend.

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Patrick's Ponderings "Justice"

There is almost too much to take in right now regarding all the places Justice needs to be actively present. From those displaced by wars and climate change, or those still suffering from the effects of the Great Recession, to Islamophobia, or the deaths of people of color, to the proliferation of guns and their resulting violence. What is becoming clearer by the day is that all of these issues of justice are completely intertwined and part of a larger system of consumption and repression. They are part of a larger reality where fear and wealth are worshipped over the Common Good. We must deal with the needs and justice making on our door steps, but we must also understand the bigger picture too.

Despite changes, which always happen, if we do not reform the larger frame of our culture, then nothing much will really be transformed. And, it is the transformation that we are seeking when we do the work of justice making and maintaining. This is also the core of the religious journey; to not just change, but to be transformed into better versions of ourselves.

When we are doing Justice making well, then we are not only transforming our little piece of the world, but we are being transformed. Or, perhaps it may be the other way around; that it is our transformations that transform the world? I personally feel it is probably both; that mutual transformation is the result of our hard work in being, and becoming the Beloved Community.

Justice – Now More Than Ever, but How?

In the words of one of our hymns (#170), “we are a justice-seeking people”. Unitarians and Universalists share a long history of working for social justice. Clara Barton, Susan B. Anthony, Theodore Parker, Dorothea Dix, James Reeb, are just a few names in our historical register. There are many more. Not all of us, not all the time – as a denomination, as church communities, and as individuals, we sometimes fall short of our ideals because we are human. But it is good to remember that we have a theology that calls us to act for justice, and role models within our faith history to inspire us with their examples.

But it is hard, sometimes to act for justice. Sometimes we are so busy with our everyday lives we miss things going on around us. Sometimes we don’t know what to say. Sometimes we just feel helpless in the face of so much to do. Here are three action steps you can take this week or this month with your family.

Talk about justice. Especially, talk about justice as a Unitarian Universalist family. Our principles call us to work for justice, equity and compassion in human relationships (“offer kindness” in Spirit play language) and to work for a world community with peace, liberty and justice for all (“insist for justice”). As you discuss current events, talk, too, about how Unitarian Universalists are called to respond to them. What does “justice for everyone” look like? How are Unitarian Universalists responding to events in the news? You can find answers to that question online at the UU World (the denominational news magazine), by subscribing to an email list such as the UU Service Committee, or by liking a Facebook page such as the Standing on the Side of Love.

Take a stand for justice. Write a letter as a family to your congressman, senator, governor or mayor. Brainstorm with your child to come up with three things they might say to a friend who says something negative about another faith tradition. Listen to what people are saying in your Facebook comments and respond with love and/or accurate information rather than ignoring hateful comments – model for your child healthy ways to approach social media.

Work on a social justice project as a family. On MLK Day, many people choose to help their community instead. To learn more about the National Day of Service, check out www.nationalservice.gov/mlkday. Ask if there is a project you and your children could do together at church – ongoing projects include weeding the playground and mulching in the Community Garden. Contact a local organization that provides meals (such as Journey of Hope Grief Counseling Center) to ask if you and your children could supply a meal in January or February.

There are opportunities all around you to be a positive force for justice. January is a great month to work on justice together!

City of Plano Energy Award

During the last few years you have approved projects to reduce your church's carbon footprint.

Over the last couple of years we have achieved the following:

We replaced the thermostats with a central controlled program. This is augmented with temporary local control when spaces are occupied during nonstandard times.

We replaced the building's one hundred sixty-two (162), four fluorescent tube light fixtures with fixtures containing two LED lights. Each fixture reduced the electrical need from 200 watts to 68 watts. This reduced the total electrical use by 21.4 kW.

We added an attic exhaust fan to reduce the heat load from the roof & ceiling. The roof had already been coated with a white sealer to reflect heat.

We replaced five rooftop HVAC heat pumps consisting of thirty-five (35) tons with five air conditioners with integrated gas heat units totaling 30 tons of the highest efficiency units available. This reduced the load to the electric grid by 152 kW.


The impact is that the energy we've saved can provide power to more than 30 new houses in Plano. We are also seeing an impact to our operating budget in excess of \$6000 per year in lower electric bills.

We submitted these projects to Plano's environmental department award program and received an honorable mention. While our impact was not as large as some of the other initiatives in Plano that won the award, we can be proud of our contribution to the environment, especially in light of the global discussions occurring now in Paris related to global climate change.

We will be looking at more initiatives in the future to further our 7th principle: Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

November Financial Report

The November 2015 financial summary for our operating accounts is listed below. Pledge income continues to be better or earlier than expected; Service Auction income is lagging a bit but is expected to catch up during December and January. Service Auction statements have been emailed to everyone who still owes. Total Service Auction income will end up at \$16k, versus \$17k budgeted. Thanks to all who donated or participated.

A mid-year review of our operating accounts resulted in a Board decision to reinstate some funding that originally had to be cut from the budget for the current year (June 15 – May 16). The Membership Coordinator position has now been funded through the remainder of the year; we will renew our Workers Compensation insurance; \$500 has also been reinstated to support Worship and Music (primarily Speaker Honoraria and Guest Musicians). This decision was based on a financially conservative projection; if we continue to do better than expected, more funding might be reinstated in the coming months.

Donate Now

November's *Share the Plate* netted \$570.31 for the Minister's Discretionary Fund. Additional contributions plus sales of Jeff Hagerhorst's breads brought in another \$934.96 to this fund.
